A Message From... Rabbi David M. Sofian

Teaching has always been at the center of everything I do as a Rabbi. Because I love teaching children, the teaching I do as part of every religious school service is a joy. Teaching budding adults in our 9th and 10th grade Confirmation class is not only fun but often inspiring. How so? Every Confirmand must pass a test before s/he can be confirmed. It is a fairly comprehensive exam, mostly made up of essay questions, and 70% is a passing grade. Also, I am not an easy grader. This means that I not only can measure their Jewish knowledge but also my effectiveness as their teacher. I feel great about the results from this year's tests. That is inspiring because it means a new generation of Jewish adults has been willing to work hard at forming a solid foundation in Jewish knowledge. They have met the challenge I put before them admirably. A new link in the chain of Jewish life is being forged. I encourage you to attend this year's Confirmation/Shavuot service Sunday May 24. You'll be able to see for yourselves how inspiring these kids are.

However, what really gets my juices going is teaching adults. Even though much of contemporary American Jewish life is focused on children and their experience of Judaism, I have always maintained that Judaism in its fullness is for adults. Getting the depth and breadth of Judaism requires adult maturity and

experience. Our adult students here understand this and are committed to enriching their personal Jewish experience by demanding content-filled education. Indeed, that is inspiring. I have learned so much because I've had to in order to teach them. The number of adults here who are interested in serious Jewish learning is one of the truly great things about Temple Israel.

Here is a partial list of adult Jewish learning opportunities at Temple Israel: the Brotherhood Brunch, our interfaith Lunch and Learn programs, Torah study every Shabbat morning, Tanakh word by word on Religious School Sunday mornings, Talmud study on Wednesdays, Adult Bar/Bat Mitzvah classes (with post-ceremony graduate classes), the Day of Learning program developed by Rabbi Bodney-Halasz, and the education programs of the Festival. This doesn't even include the Mini-University classes that we once offered, or the Introduction to Judaism classes I teach sponsored by the Dayton Synagogue Forum, or the Introduction to Judaism classes I teach at UD's Lifelong Learning Institute. If you want to stretch yourself as an adult Jew, Temple Israel is the place. A congregational Rabbi couldn't ask for more.

Thank you all for giving me these opportunities to teach the heritage of our ancestors in a way that hopefully is meaningful for today.

In recognition of *Yom Yerushalayim*, Jerusalem Day, Temple Israel and Beth Abraham Synagogue are collaborating to bring you an exciting weekend of study and celebration.

Rabbi Jonathan Greenberg, former Temple Israel rabbinic intern from 2004 to 2006, will serve as our scholar-in-residence for the weekend. Rabbi Greenberg currently serves as a Senior Fellow at the Haym Salomon Center and is a recognized expert on U.S. foreign policy, especially as it relates to the Middle East. He is a former Vice President of the Illinois Policy Institute, and the former Midwest Political Director at the American Israel Public Affairs Committee (AIPAC). Rabbi Greenberg was ordained in 2006 at Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion.

We will have three opportunities to hear from Rabbi Greenberg during his visit. On Friday night, May 15, at Temple Israel, he will speak about the Green Line and the historic significance of the 1967 borders. On Saturday morning, May 16, Rabbi Greenberg will speak at Beth Abraham about issues of occupation and settlements vis-à-vis international law. He will speak again at Temple Israel at noon on Sunday, May 17, as part of our Israel Day of Learning, examining the significance of Jerusalem in messianic thought.

The Day of Learning begins at 9:00 a.m. with a light breakfast, and continues with classes and activities for every age group, concluding at 1:00 p.m. Adults can enjoy text

study with rabbis David Sofian, Joshua Ginsberg, and Karen Bodney-Halasz and explore songs about Jerusalem with Cantor Andrea Raizen. The staffs of both Temple Israel's and Beth Abraham's religious schools are planning a number of creative learning opportunities for children and families, including arts and crafts, stories, Hebrew prayers, and more.

A delicious Kosher Israeli lunch will be served by Bernstein's Fine Catering, for \$10 per adult and \$8 for children ages 4-12. However, reservations must be received by Wednesday, May 6. Following lunch, this educational and fun-filled day will culminate in Jerusalem Jeopardy for children and families, and Rabbi Greenberg's examination of Jerusalem in messianic thought for adults.

Our Yom Yerushalayim weekend will provide us with a great opportunity to reconnect with Rabbi Greenberg, learn about Jerusalem from an expert in the field, study with clergy representing a variety of perspectives, and enjoy conversations over lunch with members of the greater community.

You may register online for Sunday's events through the Temple office, TIDBits, Chailights, and the Temple website. Be sure to pay attention to TIDBits for a final schedule of Sunday's activities.

All learning sessions are free and open to the public. For additional information please contact Rabbi Bodney-Halasz.

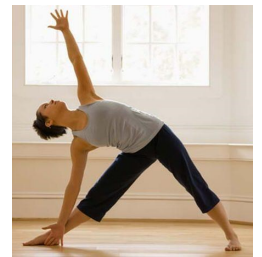

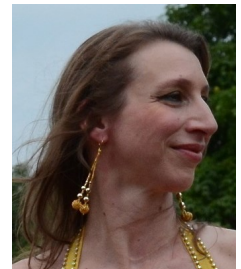
Calling All Bakers!
