## Greening the Synagogue, Greening the World Committee

Have you noticed all the new trash and recycling bins around Temple Israel? The Greening the Synagogue, Greening the World Committee of Temple Israel is pleased to announce that we now have full recycling inside and out, thanks to a grant from the Montgomery County Waste Management District and an anonymous supporting donation. For your information, Rumpke will take without separation the following items:

- Plastic bottles and jugs
- All other plastic recyclables with numbers on them
- Glass bottles and jars
- Aluminum cans
- Steel cans and lids
- Paperboard (like cereal boxes)
- Cardboard
- Office paper and junk mail
- Newspapers, magazines and inserts
- Telephone books and catalogs
- Cartons and boxes
- Waxed paper drink containers (like for milk and juice; but any plastic cap and straw must be removed and discarded in the trash)

Please help to make TI more environmentally sound by using our new recycling facilities. You can even bring in recycling from home and deposit it in our large outside dumpster. Smaller amounts can be brought inside to the bins.

We hope you will stop by the new "Green Room" (Bet) at the Jewish Cultural Festival. We will be having environmentally-related hands-on activities for adults and youth, and many green vendors and exhibitors. We will also be selling, both inside and out, recycled glass sun catchers that will support both Temple Israel and the job reentry program of The Glass reFactory, a division of Adams Brown Recycling, that manufactures them. These recycled glass rounds are four and a half inches in diameter, Israeli blue in color, with an intertwined Star of David on them, and will cost \$11 each. Gift boxes will also be available for \$1 each, perfect for gift-giving.

Our committee continues to invite folks to join us, and we want to especially encourage Temple Israel's youth to come on out. We are an open and friendly group and encourage your participation! Meetings are currently held on the first Wednesday of the month at 6:00 p.m. Our next meeting is June 3 at 6:00. We will discuss our goals and programming for the coming two years, as well as the last minute details of our participation in this year's 2015 Jewish Cultural Festival.



A Message From...  
**Rabbi David M. Sofian**

Sunday evening April 19 was truly a wonderful experience. Thank you to the whole committee and Courtney who worked so hard, and to the speakers who were so funny, and to everyone who attended, that made it the enjoyable happening it was. I will never forget the touching atmosphere that prevailed that night. What could be better than having family, friends and so many of you celebrating all we've done together by making fun of me? I loved it. After everyone else had their turn, I got a chance to speak for a few moments. What follows is a version of what I said.

Of course, I'll begin with a little story. A Jewish fellow went into a shop to look for antique Judaica. Not finding any, he asked the proprietor if he had any Jewish antiques. The shopkeeper answered: just me, as if he were a Jewish object. A way of stating my goal during our time together has been to help make sure that our congregation never becomes merely a collection of Jewish objects akin to a museum. Such a museum would be interesting because it would recall the past but it would not be a power influencing the present forward into the future. Instead, my goal has been that Temple Israel be a major, key force for present Jewish life in Dayton that would continue to be so far into the future. I hope that is what we have done.

This is why so much effort has been expended creating worship experiences like Share Shabbat. Why we have endeavored to create a wide array of learning opportunities for children and adults. Why we never

stop trying to find new ways, or reinvigorate old ways, that socially would bring together our Temple Israel community as well as the greater Dayton Jewish community and even the greater Dayton community with food, learning and fun. This work is best exemplified by the Jewish Cultural Festival. Entertainment, food, education, children's activities, social action projects and FUN all come together thanks to a great festival committee and the hundreds of volunteers exemplifying the best of Jewish community that day.

Being Temple Israel's Senior Rabbi has meant that I've gotten to work meaningfully with great staff: Joyce Denny, Ellen Finke-McCarthy, Suzanne Shaw, Alan Halpern, Courtney Cummings and Rabbi Karen Bodney-Halasz. Thank you! There are too many volunteer Temple Israelites to name who have served on the board, committees and supported programs, so I will let the list of the dedicated presidents I've worked with stand in for all: Al Brown, Elaine Bettman, Debbie DiSalvo, Nancy Cohen, Mitchell Faust, and Lisa Pierce. Being Temple Israel's Senior Rabbi has given me the opportunity to work in community organizing with LIFT Greater Dayton; take groups to Israel; teach adult Bar/Bat Mitzvah classes and conduct their ceremonies; participate in exchanges with Omega Baptist and First Baptist Churches; redo the Holy Ark in the chapel; and write a brand new Torah scroll thereby fulfilling the 613<sup>th</sup> commandment. It was due to the security I felt here leading this great congregation that Simone and I found the confidence to purchase our apartment in Modiin. Had that not happened I doubt we would be planning now to live our retirement dream.

This moment is made all the more poignant in that some of the Rabbis and their spouses who have blessed my life are here with me to share it: Larry and Cheryl Englander, Charles and Sandra Levi, Sandford and Nancy Kopnick as well as Congregational Cantor Shelly Drucker Friedman. These people have been our friends for decades and have enriched my rabbinate immensely. Two wonderful people from Lancaster, a place we left 22 years ago, Adam and David Kosowsky have come to share in this. And a couple of great friends from Emanuel Congregation in Chicago, Sandra Fernbach and Debbie Porter are here as well. What a blessing.

When we moved to Dayton none of our children were married. Now all three are and they have produced six grandchildren that we treasure. Our time with Temple Israel has been fruitful in every way.

Yet none of this would matter at all if I didn't have Simone to share it with. She makes it all possible and all worthwhile.

### A Message From...

## Rabbi Ilene Bogosian

Interim Rabbi

Shalom Chaverim! I'm delighted to join all of you and the clergy and staff of Temple Israel this year and can't wait to meet all of you. We are about to embark on a journey through what I call a "time in between."

When I was younger – much younger – summertime seemed to last forever. There were no clocks at the field where we passed seemingly endless afternoons playing kickball or baseball. Daylight hours were punctuated by our mothers' voices hollering out of kitchen windows to summon us for meals. During those elongated days, we had plenty of time to think about and explore things undreamt of during the cooler school-and activity-crammed months. Summer was a spacious gift of time in between.

Later, when I learned about the rhythms of the Jewish year, it made perfect sense to me that our tradition marks no major holidays during the summer and that an entire month dedicated to *heshbon hanefesh*, an accounting of the soul, falls during that season. The month of Elul, which begins in the middle of August this year, is Jewish time in between. It's an opportunity to slow down and imagine new possibilities before the new year begins. It's a season for gathering energy for new initiatives, creativity and relationships. Of course it is also a time to give and seek forgiveness.

During the summers of my childhood, a moment always arrived

in late August when I was ready to go back to school, to begin again, to try new things. Enemies from the year before could be the best friends of this year. Algebra might turn out to be interesting. Anything was possible. But I don't think I could have let go of the past if I had not been able to stretch out and relax during summer vacations. Those months opened me to new understanding and gave me the perspective I needed to forgive hurts and let go of grievances. I'm sure that would not have been possible if the new school year began on July 1. We all need time to grieve losses, untangle hurt feelings, consolidate learning and reconnect with our strengths.

This year it will be an honor to accompany the Temple Israel community through twelve months of Elul. We are beginning a process and conversation that will shape the nature of this community for many years. All transitions immerse us in both sadness about what and who we have left behind and exciting opportunities to participate in the shaping of a new vision of the future. We need to honor both our sadness and our excitement as we move through this year. I hope that every one of you will join the conversation and that we will make 5776 a year of growth and new vision. This is our season of transformation. May Temple Israel move from strength to strength.

It is with great excitement that I announce a wonderful new addition to our religious school!

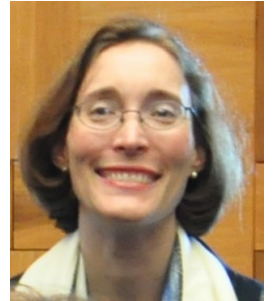

### Celebrate Rabbi Sofian’s Final Weekend

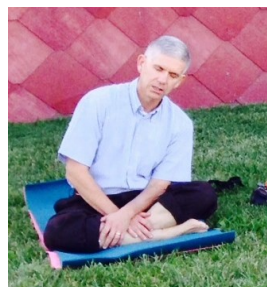
