A Message From...

Rabbi Ilene Bogosian

Interim Senior Rabbi

Wanted: Wife for future patriarch. Must hail from the land of his father's birth and be generous with water, willing to draw up from her local well for camels as well as men. Very hospitable, willing to travel. Canaanites need not apply.

In a few weeks we will read a part of the book of Genesis (Chaye Sarah, Genesis 23:1 – 25-18) that describes the first headhunter in the Torah. Abraham is growing old. He sends the most senior servant in his household back to the land of his origin to find a wife for his son, Isaac. The servant camps out by a well where the women of the ancestral settlement draw water at a certain time of the day. He prays that the woman who offers him a drink and is also willing to do the additional work of watering his camels will be the chosen one for Isaac. The one who fulfills those requirements is Rebecca. That is how our second matriarch was "discovered" at the Biblical version of a Hollywood drugstore soda fountain.

The Torah records the search, negotiations with her family, and Rebecca's first encounter with Isaac. What we don't hear in this account are Isaac's experiences of this search process. We do not know what he did while he was at home waiting. I don't imagine it was easy to pass the time while wondering about the outcome of the Wife Search.

Like Isaac, our community is waiting now for the outcome of a search. Our Rabbinic Search Committee has begun a very demanding process. We thank them and their families for the time and talent that they will invest in the journey to find a new rabbi for Temple Israel. We know what they are doing. What about the rest of us?

I would like to imagine that during the Wife Search, Isaac spent some time recording the stories of his old life, when he and his parents were young. Then perhaps Isaac began to straighten things up. Then he might have looked at how his household was running to see if things could be even better than they already were. Perhaps he sent out a message to everyone in the camp asking for suggestions. So it was that on the day when Rebecca came riding down the road on her camel, Isaac was ready to bring her into his tent, so that they could start a new life.

Sometime in the near future our Rabbinic Search Committee will finish its work. Before they bring a new rabbi home to meet us (not, I'd imagine, on a camel!), we need to follow Isaac's example. Please take a look around you. Let us know what you love about Temple Israel. Tell us also about what we need to improve. We thank all of you for your participation in the conversations we held last summer. But – let's keep talking!
