Several of you have already commented how interesting it is that the holidays will fall on the same days of the week next year (again) – making four of five years in a row that Rosh Hashanah begins on a Sunday night! So I thought I'd take a moment to explain how the calendar isn't such a coincidence, and, no, you aren't going crazy thinking holidays disproportionately fall on certain days of the week.

A long time ago, in a land far, far away... There was a Temple, some important rabbis, and witnesses who liked looking at the moon. Based on testimony from the witnesses, a new month was declared at the new moon, and messengers were sent out to the Diaspora. Those in the Diaspora began adding an extra day (Yom Tov Sheni, second holiday-day) to the festivals, to be sure that they celebrated them on the correct day. There are several amusing, albeit not necessarily accurate, stories regarding how this practice came about. Even in this period, there were certain calculations to ensure that the lunar cycles and solar cycles stayed in balance. If the sun wouldn't reach the vernal equinox by the middle of

Nissan (Passover), they would declare a leap month (Adar II) to keep things in balance. That way the "spring" holiday of Passover always fell in the spring.

Around 350 CE, Hillel II ordained a calendar entirely determined by calculation, as we use today. We can calculate the new moon, the vernal equinox, and everything else necessary to create the calendar. It is because of these precise calculations that the Reform Movement wrote a Responsa negating the need for Yom Tov Sheni, since there is no longer a lack of certainty over the beginning of the festivals. (Side note, the second day of Rosh Hashanah is not due to Yom Tov Sheni, but rather that some months have two days of Rosh Chodesh while some have only one. Tishrei is one that always has two days, so Rosh Hashanah is two days, even within the land of Israel.)

So this gets us back to our question: why are the holidays disproportionately on certain days? Well you see, there's a little leeway in calculating to get everything to line up as needed. There's a principle in calculating the calendar of: 'Lo ADU Rosh; (which means not on 1, 4, 6 is

Rosh Hashanah). Rosh Hashanah cannot be on the first, fourth, or sixth day of the week, meaning the first day of Rosh Hashanah will never fall on a Sunday, Wednesday, or Friday. (And Lo BADU Pesach – the days, 2, 4, 6 on which the first day of Passover won't fall.) Why? If Rosh Hashanah falls on a Wednesday, then Yom Kippur (day) will be on Friday, and end into Shabbat. If Rosh Hashanah falls on a Friday, then Yom Kippur (day) will be on a Sunday, and begin immediately after Shabbat. In either of those scenarios, Shabbat and Yom Kippur are adjacent, and the fast/Shabbat combination is difficult to prepare for and removes the honor given to one or both days. If Rosh Hashanah falls on a Sunday, then Hoshana Rabba (the seventh day of Sukkot) falls on Shabbat, which was also seen as problematic, because of the tradition to beat the willow branches on this day (which can't be done on Shabbat). These principles combine with a couple others to determine the calculation of the year. If Rosh Hashanah would fall on one of those three days, the year is adjusted (by way of a couple months that can have 29 or 30 days, since a lunar month is about 29.5 days) and Rosh Hashanah is delayed by a day (or two, to avoid other issues that are far more technical). So there you have it: Rosh Hashanah (first day) will be a Monday next year, which means you can mark your calendars now for Pizza in the Hut (October 13) and Consecration (October 20) on Sunday evenings again!
