

## Enjoy a Fascinating Virtual Tour of Israel

Please join us on a four-day tour of Israel courtesy of Zoom. We will spend four afternoons there,

**Monday -**

**Thursday, on**

**March 8 - 11.** Our

daily visits will last one hour, from 5:00

- 6:00 p.m. EST, so we'll be back in time for dinner. During the tour, you'll be able to ask questions and comment with Muki Jankelowitz, one of Israel's best tour guides. Muki was Temple Israel's guide when we visited two years ago and, also, gave us a fascinating Zoom tour of Jerusalem last April.

Where will we be going? We'll visit four very different parts of Israel: the desert, Galilee, Tel Aviv and Jerusalem. Even if you've visited Israel before, there will be something new to see and learn.

Our tour begins in the desert, which plays a disproportionate role in the Biblical stories. It is a backdrop for many of the events in the lives of the patriarchs and matriarchs. The desert is also the geographically largest part of the State of Israel. We will explore the desert looking at its history and the challenges and opportunities it presents in modern Israel.



**Virtual Tour of Israel**

Galilee, lush and green by Israeli standards, was the site of a number of major revolutions in Jewish history. It was the site of the writing of the Mishna, Jewish mysticism, and Zionist pioneering. We will visit the sites

and tell the stories of these revolutions.

Tel Aviv is the 24/7 modern city of Israel. We'll find out what makes this city so cutting edge in its business, culinary and cultural aspects, and why Tel Aviv is the fulfillment of the founding fathers' and mothers' dreams.

We conclude our visit in Jerusalem, the focal point of Jewish life. We will look at the history and centrality for the Jewish people (and for Christianity and Islam) of Jerusalem. We will also grapple with the issues that the modern city confronts.

## THIS YEAR IN JERUSALEM!

We conclude every seder reciting: “Next Year in Jerusalem.” Let it be so! Before we return to our seders for Passover, join me for a tour of the land of Israel, stopping, of course, in Jerusalem. Join a “busload” of congregants as we experience Israel virtually with one of Israel’s most qualified and knowledgeable licensed Tour Guides, Muki Jankelowitz. Muki led our Israel trip two years ago and was by far the most insightful guide of all I have met. Together we will explore biblical and modern Israeli sites, all without leaving our homes. Having lived in Israel for two years, I know there is no place like it in the world. Israel plays a fundamental role in our Jewish identity. Isn’t it time to discover why? Your reservation includes four days of touring (**Monday – Thursday March 8-11, from 5 p.m. to 6 p.m.**) for you and your household. Each night we will discover a different region of the country.

Our Second Seder (March 28) is a highlight of our programming year. This single event furthers our mission severalfold, not the least of which being that it enables our youngest congregants to partake in the joy of Jewish summer camp. Jewish camping is one of the most influential experiences in a young person’s Jewish identity, but it comes with a hefty price-tag. Each year, by catering the second seder ourselves, we have raised a few thousand

dollars to subsidize camp registration costs for our families. It is my hope that our group exploration of Israel will fulfill our goal of raising these funds in a year we cannot have our seder dinner together. If each of our participating households makes a \$36 contribution, we can make a powerful impact on our children’s lives. I am excited to share this beautiful land with all of you and it warms my heart to know that by participating, both you and our children will benefit in a meaningful Jewish way.

Though we will not have an in-person second seder this year, we will gather again for a fun communal second seder through Zoom. You will only need to access the internet – we’ll provide our personalized hagaddah. It may be easiest to “cast” your device to a larger television screen, which some of you have learned to do already. If you have not and have questions about how to do this, please don’t hesitate to contact us for more information.

A small request: If you are hosting a virtual first night seder and have an extra spot at your virtual table, please consider sharing it with a congregant who might otherwise be alone.

A series of three drive-thru events will take place this spring in April, May and June, each one centering around a specific holiday or aspect of Judaism and featuring fresh baked goods available for pre-order. We will proudly welcome people of all faiths to share a Jewish experience with our friends, members, rabbis, and staff.

**FOOD:** The Temple Bakery returns with delicious hamantaschen (April), rugelach (May), and honey cake (June) to tantalize your taste buds and immerse your mouth in the richness of these beloved Jewish desserts. In addition, Evans Bakery will offer challah each month and there will be a featured food truck partner at each event.

**VIRTUAL OY VEY 5K & CHAI CHALLENGE:** Run or walk in the Virtual Oy Vey 5k this June. Or, increase your mileage with the Chai Challenge and complete 18k in June, or for the ultimate endurance feat, register for the Triple Chai Challenge, committing to 18k per month from April - June. **EDUCATION:** Delve into the meaning and history of Jewish holidays, rituals, and traditions at each event. Attendees will discover little known facts about Judaism as well explore the similarities and differences with other faiths. There will even be a chance to ask the rabbi your Jewish question!

March 2021. Remember Purim last year, March 9? It feels like an eternity ago that we gathered for a mostly normal Purim, a little extra handwashing and sanitizer, but we celebrated, we hugged, we played. It was a little surreal, this novel Coronavirus, of “International Health Concern” was looming – the very first positive test in Ohio was that morning. I was preparing for the seemingly imminent scenario where we would need to cancel school or go virtual for a couple weeks. We had no idea.

That first Friday night at home, felt like a vacation without services. Then we started making some videos: I was really proud of the teacher appreciation video; spent hours on it. Our first Shabbat service live from our homes? Spent a

good chunk of the week getting the back-end technology set up. We were so proud of what we accomplished – but remember all the glitches we experienced?

We are a year into this pandemic. We just celebrated Purim again, this time from our homes, completing a year of Jewish life in varying degrees of isolation. We’ve come so far – and not just in our technological understanding of video-editing and virtual service leading, but in other areas as well. There are things that if you told me at last year’s Purim Carnival, I’d be able to do with the fluency we are: from video editing to crocheting a doll, (while also creating a human being – I’m pretty proud of that); I’m not sure I would have believed you.

And yet, this year has taken its toll.

There are days that I revel in the relative silence of my home, and the ability to start a load of laundry on my lunch break instead of after the kids are in bed. But the lack of physical connection, the draining nature of video-conferencing, the heightened baseline anxiety, the exhaustion from trying to keep up with the latest news and research around COVID, the fake smiles while keeping life as normal as possible for our children – there is a cost. A cost that a new hobby, sourdough bread, or a little extra sleep aren’t going to magically make up for. And this is why I’m proud that we are offering QPR training (see below) this March – so that we can better support each other should that toll have put a loved one or friend in crisis.

Pandemic fatigue is very real. Please mask up, get your vaccines when you’re eligible, wash your hands, stay safe and stay healthy – I look forward to the day that I can write a reflection on a year post-pandemic – and as we will pray this month about Elijah’s coming at the end of Seder – may those post-pandemic days come, *bimherah v’yameinu*, quickly and in our day!

## Suicide Awareness Training

Sunday March 7, 11:00 to Noon

We know the pandemic has caused a toll on many people’s mental health, thus now it is as important as ever to be aware of how ourselves, our loved ones, and our friends are doing. QPR is a suicide awareness and prevention program, which much like CPR, serves to teach you to act in a crisis, but does not teach you to become a professional mental health caregiver. In the one-hour of this virtual training, you will learn a little about the myths/facts of suicide, how to identify warning signs that someone may be contemplating completing suicide, and how to help someone in crisis until more trained help can be sought out.


