Friday, April 16 from 4:00 - 7:00 p.m.

For our first Taste of the Jewish Cultural Festival, we are focusing on the holiday of Purim and celebrating Queen Esther's bravery in saving the Jewish people. In this drive-thru event, everyone will have the chance to experience a taste of our culture and heritage in a fun and family-friendly way:



FOOD: The Temple Bakery returns with delicious **hamantaschen** in three flavors to tantalize your taste buds and immerse your mouth in the richness of these beloved Jewish desserts. Pre-order options are by the dozen, and you can pick a single flavor dozen (raspberry, apricot, or poppyseed) or a mixed dozen which contains four cookies of each flavor. Each dozen is \$5 and pre-order forms are available on tidayton.org/festival. We'll also have delicious **challah** available to help you welcome in Shabbat. Each challah is \$5 and may be pre-ordered as well. Our food truck partner this month is **Zombie Dogz**, who will have both all-beef hot dogs and veggie dogs available for purchase at the event. (No pre-orders necessary.)

EDUCATION: Delve into the meaning and history of the Purim story. Attendees will also discover little known facts about Temple Israel and Reform Judaism, and see a few fun Jewish jokes in the car line. Have a question? Our rabbis will be onsite to share their knowledge.

CHILDREN: Special activity kits with interactive crafts and projects help to share Purim traditions with our youngest attendees. These to-go boxes will also include clues to a secret escape room game online, created just for this event. Collect all of the clues to solve the final puzzle.

ENTERTAINMENT: Hand-selected music will feature Jewish artists in multiple genres. These tunes will be broadcast to your car radio during the event and will feature delightful and spirited performances from some of today's most popular musicians and bands.

This seismic shift in Jewish living gave rise to the very synagogues that now eagerly anticipate our return.

Such change does not come easily nor without discomfort. It forces us to face our mortality and urges us to invest more in our relationships with family, friends, and our own self-care. In a year in which we have all been tested, I am ever grateful to all those in our Temple community who have

gone above and beyond to help keep us connected to one another. Thank you to all of you who have volunteered over the past year to make phone calls on behalf of our Caring Committee. What makes Temple Israel so special is its congregants. It brings me comfort to know we are watching out for each other in our isolation, but it also brings me great joy to watch as new friendships are formed through these calls. Though we are continually trying to improve our call system, it has enabled us to successfully make thousands of calls. What an incredible accomplishment! Our work is hardly over, but let's pause at this anniversary to appreciate this special group. May we strive to reach out to one another in times of rest as well as we have during this period of crisis.

A single person may have an idea, but a committee creates a plan. In Parashat Yitro, Jethro sees Moses surrounded by hordes of people asking him for advice. He asks: "Why do you sit alone with all the people standing upon you from morning to evening?" Moses defends his position, but Jethro admonishes him, saying: "The thing you do is not good. You will surely wear yourself out.... you will not be able to do it alone." He teaches Moses that he must delegate authority to trusted judges who will seek his counsel only in the most difficult of cases.

As Temple's Adult Education Chair, I am choosing to follow the advice of Jethro. Our community will benefit most if I expand my committee and surround myself with the wise voices of other congregants. Will you lend your vision and skill to this effort? Together we can provide meaningful opportunities to learn about Judaism and ourselves.

One of my greatest memories from my swimming days was stepping up on the blocks, in Israel, for the 100m Freestyle in 2005. It was a mix of being petrified and more excited than ever before. I was representing Team USA at World Maccabiah Games (“Jewish Olympics”), and little did I know, but I was about one minute away from earning what I believe was Team USA’s first medal of the Games. What was powerful about that moment was that it was the first time in my swimming career – 13 years of competitive swimming at that point – that my Jewish identity and my athletic identity were complementing one another instead of functioning in parallel or butting heads (services or practice, e.g.). Most Jewish athletes don’t get moments like that one, or so I thought at the time.

That moment really sparked my interest in the intersection of Judaism and sports, and fueled the work I did for 6 Points Sports Academy, Kulanu, and more. Recently, as I laced up a new pair of running shoes, dug up my favorite pair of running socks, and popped my headphones in to start running again, it felt good, and not just because of the me time with Jewish camp melodies busting in my headphones. After being physically limited by months of pregnancy and postpartum restrictions, to feel my

heart beating fast was amazing – and suddenly felt like one of the most Jewish things I could be doing.

Why? Judaism has much to say about the importance of taking care of our bodies – from Hillel teaching the importance of the mitzvah to engage in personal hygiene, to Maimonides teaching that maintaining physical health is primary to the rest of the commandments, because if we aren’t healthy, we cannot fulfil the others. We are also commanded to protect the vulnerable and maintain the wellbeing of the community – so to engage in a form of exercise that keeps oneself healthy, without adding to the risk of spreading COVID, is among the best Jewish actions I can think of to do right now.

So why tell you this? This month kicks off the first of the three Taste of the Jewish Cultural Festival events, and with it, I will begin the Triple Chai Challenge – running 18k (about 11mi) each month over the next three months. I’m happy to say that Matt and I will both be undertaking this challenge, and Stephanie is very excited to see how much she can run too! I hope you’ll register for the Oy Vey 5k, or the Chai or Triple Chai Challenges, if you so dare – as a way to take care of yourself, fulfilling a Jewish obligation and supporting Temple while you are at it!
