In addition to seeing and hearing about their travels, you may also join them live on *Rosh Chodesh Shevat* - Monday, January 23 - as they pray at the Western Wall (*Kotel*) with the Women of the Wall, an organization comprised of women from across Jewish denominations who fight for the right to wear prayer shawls, pray and read from the Torah collectively and out loud at the *Kotel* in Jerusalem. THINKING OF SUMMER

As the end of the year approaches, one thing I am focusing on is Jewish summer camp. (Yes, I said summer camp in relation to December.) And yes, I often get responses of, "Isn't it a bit early to be thinking about summer camp plans?" The short answer is: no. Registration for various URJ summer opportunities has already opened, and some of the specialty camps may already be filling up. So, this shameless plug for camp is not just about awareness.

I grew up as the antithesis of a 'camp kid.' Our students are often surprised to learn that my first overnight camp experience (Jewish or otherwise) was as a staff member in my 20's, and not as a bright-eyed third grader. It was still magical. I was the kid, who although extremely proud of my Jewish identity, was "too involved" in swimming to go away to Jewish camp for four weeks and skip training. I was also a kid who thought Jewish camp was completely out of my parents' budget, even if I wanted to go.

One thing I love about Temple Israel and the Reform Movement is that those two concerns need not be obstacles standing in the way of attending camp. Short on time in the summer? No problem. In the past decade or so, the URJ has opened three varieties of specialty camps for those who have other activity commitments precluding them from attending a longer, more typical summer camp. The 6 Points "brand" offers Sports, Sci-Tech, and Creative Arts camps for those looking for a more focused experience, while still offering

a taste of all the 'usual' elements of Jewish camp. Goldman Union Camp Institute (GUCI) offers that "little-of-everything" Jewish camp with plenty of opportunities to try new activities and enjoy old favorites, all in two- or four- week sessions. Need some financial assistance to attend? Various scholarships are available through the camps, One Happy Camper, and generously through Temple Israel to help make whatever option is your camper's best fit possible for them. The deadline to apply for Temple camperships is December 31. I encourage you to apply now. You may reach out to me for an application - educator@tidayton.org.

Our Temple camperships are made possible through the Joseph and Janet Patterson Campership Fund, the Schwarz Camp Fund, generosity of Temple donors, and the proceeds of the Second Seder. Since we have not had the Second Seder in person the last two years, I invite you to consider donating to one of these funds. Your contribution will help send a child to camp where they can immerse themselves in a Jewish environment that builds the next generation of leaders of our people.
