INTERVIEW WITH THE PRESIDENT

TEMPLE ISRAEL WELCOMES KIT BREWER AS RABBINIC INTERN

As we embark upon a new year, Temple Israel is delighted to welcome Kit Brewer as our rabbinic intern. Kit, who prefers they/them/their for personal pronouns, has already begun to make their presence known by leading Torah study and presenting a sermon or two.

A little background: Kit completed their conversion to Judaism in early 2023 and joined as a new member immediately thereafter. They jumped into Jewish life at Temple Israel, serving first as a substitute/teaching assistant in the religious school and then spending several weeks at the URJ Goldman Union Camp Institute (GUCI) as a senior staff member this summer.

It was my pleasure to chat with Kit in preparation for this introduction. Here are their thoughtful answers and insights.

Could you share a little bit of your background?

I graduated from Miami University in January with a Bachelor of Arts in Independent Studies. I started helping teach at Temple Israel's religious school in February of this year, which I am returning to alongside my internship. I hope to go to rabbinic school within the next year or two to become either a congregational rabbi or a rabbi who works with college Hillel programs. In my spare time I like to write, play music, and play D&D with my friends. I have a little kitty named Mergo who likes to help me light candles at home on Shabbat.

When you were welcomed as a new member last spring, your mother and great aunt were here and quite proud of you. How are they supporting your efforts this year?

Not all of my family have been supportive of my Jewish journey, so I'm incredibly grateful for my mom and great aunt. They love Share Shabbat and are happy to see me thriving in my work here at Temple. They're both very excited for my hopefully enrolling in rabbinic school in the next couple of years.

What do you want to accomplish during your year as our rabbinical intern?

During my internship I hope to learn as much as I

can, grow as a leader, and begin to give back to the wonderful community at Temple who have cared for me so much this past year. I'm especially excited to shadow life cycle events! Fingers crossed I get to help with a wedding.



You have already led Torah Study and preached your first sermon. What other challenges are you looking forward to meeting?

I'm definitely looking forward to writing more sermons and leading more Torah study, but I'm also looking forward to learning more about pastoral care. I want to be as prepared as possible for moments that aren't as joyous as the other things I've gotten to do so far.

How did you come to make the decision to convert to Judaism?

I never really felt comfortable in the religious community I grew up in, neither did I have a choice for a long time on whether I could be there or not. As I finished college, I found myself craving the benefits of having a religious community again. I found that Reform Judaism aligned with the morals and values I'd developed as an adult, and I was free to choose what was meaningful to me. Judaism met me where I was, and I felt I didn't have to change anything about myself. So I looked for Reform synagogues near my house, settled on Temple Israel, and called ahead of attending my first shabbat service. I've been every week almost without fail (minus the summer at camp) ever since!

You spent the summer at GUCI, which is a full immersion in Judaism. What delighted you the most?

Surprised you?

If I had to pick a favorite thing from camp this summer, it would have to be Havdalah. It was my favorite part of the week at GUCI. Sitting on the Chevra with



everyone and singing as evening came on was so magical. I was honestly surprised that I found singing, praying, and having services every day so enriching. I really miss it!

Please join me in making Kit feel welcome within our community. If you haven't met Kit yet in person, be sure to introduce yourself when you see them.

Temple Israel has begun the process of restoring living, sustainable native landscapes with the Courtyard Religious School Native Garden.

This biodiverse sensory-rich habitat has been newly planted by our religious school children as they engage in learning and practice of Tikkun Olam. Temple partnered with the Marianist Environmental Education Center (MEEC) and Steve Adler, Groundskeeper Landscape Group, to create an ecosystem supportive of food and habitat for our native pollinators, birds, and wildlife.
