RABBI'S MESSAGE

JOURNEY OF COMPASSION: LESSONS I LEARNED FROM THE PEOPLE I MET IN ISRAEL

The Talmud teaches that visiting the infirmed relieves 1/60th of their pain. It is integral to their healing process. Offering comfort from mental and physical suffering is part of our responsibility as Jews. Going on a mission trip to Israel was my way of fulfilling that duty, of saying, "You are not alone. I'm with you."

I also hoped my trip would forge a connection with our community here, so that we could contribute to the immediate needs of safety and security, display empathy through notes and letters, and serve as witnesses to the pain of our brothers and sisters. Thank you for being a part of this journey - for the donations, cards, and attention to the stories I have shared through TIDBITS.

As I reflect one last time on the experience, I am truly overwhelmed by the vast networks of support built over the last few months. This small country came together in exceptional ways when the circumstances demanded it. You wouldn't believe the amount of logistics involved to ensure that survivors, refugees, and reserve units all were safe and equipped to meet their basic needs. The government, in the midst of a national security crisis, was ill-prepared to meet those needs. But the entire array of Israeli citizens stepped



in, linking micro-communities together in unprecedented ways. Even in their grief, they found strength and resiliency, holding onto one another, and leaving no one behind to fend for themselves. When we met with Ron Segev, a Nova festival survivor, the lesson he hoped we took from our visit was love, ahavat Yisrael. I believe that is exactly what I witnessed when I repeatedly heard about selfless acts of love, creating bonds between strangers in desperate times.

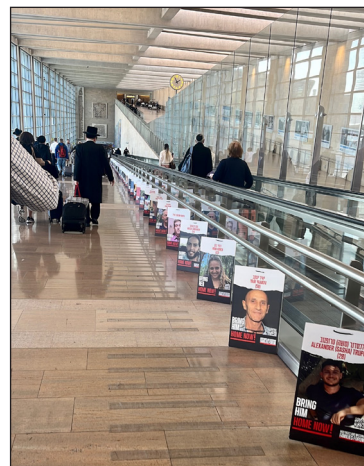
While I was there, I learned many important lessons from each of the people I met:

From the displaced families in hotels, I learned how vital and stabilizing a home, job, family, support system, and school are during times of unbearable trauma.

From the Fuchsberg Center, I learned that simply living in Israel means participating in the pain of the Jewish people.

From Khaled, I learned never to underestimate our enemy, and the need to encourage strong leadership from the moderate Arab community to help improve the lives of the Arabs and Palestinians in the region, and to increase government support for the non-Jewish community in Israel.

From Ayesha, who spoke about the deep loyalty of Bedouins to Israel, even risking their own lives to save the lives of Jews on October 7th, I learned to be more compassionate to the pain of Arab-Israelis who feel like "unwanted children of a divorce."



From Sheikh Jamal, I was reminded that we share many of the same ethics as Muslims and that Hamas' behavior is not representative of Islamic values.

From Ruth and Julia, I learned that many Israelis may never feel safe again in their homes.

From Lir, I learned never to give up hope or stop flying kites of peace, but to find the strength from within to rebuild.

From Ron, I learned that being Israeli means being willing to sacrifice for people you don't even know, to care for others without hesitation.

From David, the Zionist, who voluntarily drove down to protect Kibbutz Nahal Oz with nothing but a pistol, I learned the importance of not standing idly by as one's neighbor bleeds.

From Brothers in Arms, I learned that you can't wait for someone else to act when there is work to be done. Like Nachshon at the sea, we mustn't hesitate to jump in with both feet to help.

From Naamah, who found her strength in the psalms, and Yair, who jumped into combat even when he wasn't supposed to yet, I learned how dire it is that we start looking at the long game in order to survive.

From Uri, Noam, and Elad, I learned that strength comes from within and to appreciate the IDF's advanced life-saving capabilities in the field.

From Cynthia, I learned the importance of people coming together despite divisions in politics and religion.



From the families at hostage square, I learned about the power of hope.

From Ilana, who was sitting by her son's grave weeping, I learned that even in Israel Jews still question how good it is to be Jewish when the world hates us.

From Raz, I learned about hope and resiliency and the work it takes to return to daily life, as well as the need for safe shared spaces in communal healing.

I could go on and on. But what I didn't find answers to was what the "day after" will look like. The question arose at every meeting. What I did come to



see was that the process of rebuilding is a multi-pronged endeavor with many phases. It will require returning to daily activities, helping get survivors to come out from under their blankets. It will require seeking necessary mental, physical, and spiritual help. It will require survivors to continue to tell their stories as part of their path to healing. It will require the government to build better infrastructure to support the displaced and better support the Arab-Israeli population. It will require moderate Arab leaders who are willing to call out extremism. It will require finding ways to memorialize loved ones and find ways to keep the memories alive. It will require significant breakthroughs in treatments for communal and personal trauma. It will require Israelis to physically return to spaces that don't feel safe, to rebuild destroyed homes, and plant new trees in blood-soaked soil. It will require finally letting the genie out of the bottle and having conversations among different groups that share the same fate. It means demanding more Yad b'Yad schools, overcoming language barriers among children.

But before we can really rebuild, we need our hostages returned. So many lives have been put on hold, like Ron's and Noam's, who are unable to return to work until they come home, or like Raz, who still has friends that are captive and cannot even think of throwing another party with them in Gaza. I pray for the safe return of the hostages, with minimal loss of life.

In the Mishnah, Rabbi Tarfon reminds us not to give up, especially when the task is daunting. We must remember each of us has a role to play and we must not be discouraged from doing the work. I pray that Israel continues to build upon its strong foundations of love and kindness, seen so abundantly since the war began. May this endure long after this war, that we always look out for one another in difficult times and never stop dreaming of what is possible. I still believe that peace is within reach and, as the Nova survivors remind us, we will all dance again.
